Can you identify the places described in the quotes? The initial letters of the places, when re-arranged, make an essential seasonal item (two words).

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1. There is a somewhat steep descent into _____, the land of waterfalls, and a well-known tourists' centre. At the end of the village the Keighley and Kendal highway is joined
2. From _____ Station, which stands high above the village, a wide range of hill country is over-looked, with Penyghent a notable landmark.
3. Charles Kingsley, while staying at Tarn House, visited _____ which figures in his *Water Babies* as Lowthwaite Crag.
4. The _____, in the form of a rectangular stone trough, stands by the roadside. In appearance there is nothing to suggest that it possesses any unusual features, and any visitor unaware of its peculiarities would probably pay little attention to it.
5. [Settle] itself occupies a position on the Great _____ Fault, a series of geological dislocations to which the district owes much of its rugged grandeur.
6. The Foss is gained by passing over the stile at the far side of the bridge and walking downstream for a hundred yards or so. _____ Foss is always attractive, and during a flood the scene is magnificent.
7. Near the church wall at _____ stand the remains of the old stocks. The church of St. Oswald, restored in 1868, is supposed to have a C15th tower.
8. In the peaceful "God's acre" at _____ many worthy dalesmen have been laid to rest. Thomas Hurtle was buried here in 1834. Here also is the last earthly resting place of the late Mr. Walter Morrison
9. The land at the foot of the scar was formerly occupied by a lake of tolerably large dimensions, from whence _____ - "outer mere" - probably derived its name. The cave, like many others in the district, is a water-eroded passage in the limestone.
10. _____ is an unpretentious place enough, but has associations of more than ordinary interest in connection with the pioneer labours of Richard Frankland
11. _____, by reason of its situation and the wealth of its natural attractions, is quite a popular holiday resort. It has long been a favorite centre for geologists who find the area of great interest Even the non-geologist will be interested in [the nearby] unique collection of ice-borne Silurian blocks.
12. In passing through the village along the tree-bordered west bank of the stream – a tributary of the Wenning – where creeper-clad cottages stand half hidden by foliage and a profusion of summer flowers, one quickly realises the picturesque beauty of _____.
13. For beauty of situation _____ has few equals; its clustered, well-built houses set amid the trees, with the beechwood background and limestone scars above, form an attractive picture it still remains the best wooded hamlet for miles around.
